

## TRIBUTE TO BOB LEHMAN



## BUILDING COMMUNITY, TOGETHER

Alberta Beach, Val Quentin, and Sunset Point are intricately connected; three distinct municipalities within one community. When it comes to community building, this presents both opportunities and challenges.

I believe there are 2 vital pieces to building community: collaboration and informed and engaged residents. The ability for separate administrations and Council's to work together is an important part of building a thriving community. Collaboration between Councils and municipalities has improved drastically over the last few years.

For example, the three villages have been working together to find areas where we can collaborate to realize cost savings, and also to move our larger community forward and ensure we can flourish in the future. While individual Councils and councillors have an important part to play, their role is often strategic and sets the tone for how the entire community will work together. In addition to working with each other, community building also involves collaboration with volunteer organizations, business leaders, other levels of government, schools, and our citizens. Much can be said about the importance of each of these stakeholders, but it is really our volunteers and community groups that are at the forefront of building community. These organizations and people operate our community halls, provide food hampers at Christmas, run our amazing community events like SnoMo Days and PolyDays, provide sports and social activities, and ensure there is a safe place for people of all ages to get together, to name a few.

Another vital aspect to building community is having informed and engaged residents, who help shape the future of our community and keep Councils accountable. To be successful, communication and engagement must go both ways. One might be surprised at how much information is available on our municipal websites. Information like Council meeting packages and minutes, financial statements and budgets, bylaws and policies, contact information, etc. Monitoring these websites is the easiest way is to stay up to date and informed. If you want to kick it up a notch, attend a Council meeting (you may even be able to stream them from the comfort of your home) or contact a Councillor. Additionally, volunteering is a great way to stay informed and to directly shape what happens in our community. You can also keep up to date by following our various social media feeds. However, as wonderful as it is for community conversation, social media alone cannot solve concerns or move the community forward. It does not easily lend itself to meaningful discussion of issues nor real-life solutions.

As an elected official, I really appreciate when people reach out to talk about the community, what they want to see, and how we can work together to improve things. Attending Council meetings and speaking with Councillors are great ways to get to know your elected officials and to keep them accountable.

#### **How Can You Help Our Lakes?**

Blue-green algae thrives on Phosphorus and Nitrogen. We can decrease the amount of these nutrients going into the lake in many ways by reducing the amount of nutrients produced (e.g. not using fertilizer) or by increasing the natural absorption of nutrients before they reach the lake. Plants with deep root systems (trees and shrubs) absorb these nutrients and decrease the amount going into the lake. This is especially important along the edges of the water (riparian zone).

THERE ARE MANY THINGS WE CAN DO TO DECREASE OUR NEGATIVE IMPACT ON THE LAKE.

Responsibilities may include:

- 1. Contacting new neighbors who move into the area, to see if they are interested in registering with the Block Watch Program.
- 2. Assist as required during an Emergency (door-to-door evacuation process/roadblock control/etc)
- 3. Keeping the Block map or group contact information current.
- 4. Sharing information with Block Captains for distribution to residents.
- 5. Encouraging residents to participate and communicate to help "spread the word" about suspicious activities in the neighbourhood.
- 6. Block Captains can work with the DEM/DDEM to fan out information via telephone or email

## **EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT**







Every winter, we deal with winter climate conditions in Alberta.

People can be vulnerable to the effects of snow, ice, slush, and low outdoor temperatures. One of the best ways to be a good neighbor is to keep an eye on nearby seniors during the coldest and, for them, the most dangerous months of the year.

1. Plan to Help; Don't Wait for Them to Ask - Make a plan to reach out to them, to offer assistance

#### 2. Check on Your Neighbours Before and After Storms

Keep informed on up-to-date weather forecasts, and check that your neighbors are doing well. Encourage them to have a battery-powered radio, a first aid kit, their prescription medications, and all other needful supplies.

#### 3. Keep in Contact Regularly

Offer to exchange phone numbers with neighbours so you can be in touch, or walk over and check up on your neighbor periodically. Ask if they are feeling in good health and if they have things like smoke detectors, carbon monoxide detectors, and operational heat and water.

#### 4. Help with Shovelling and Walking on Ice

Consider shovelling walk and driveways when appropriate. Slipping can occur on even a small patch of ice, salt and sand. Encourage investment in snow-melting mats that can be placed on walkways leading to the home, ensuring that pathways stay clear and slip-free all winter.

#### 5. Try to Keep Them From Venturing Outside

A breath of fresh air may do everyone good, but in the wintertime, the elderly can easily get frostbite or hypothermia if outside in freezing temperatures for very long. Bring your elderly neighbor's mail or newspaper to the door and pick up groceries or other items for them on your way home from work to minimize their time out in the cold.

#### 6. Invite Your Neighbor Over for a Hot Meal

Consider inviting your neighbor over for a meal or bringing it to them to eat at home. As most seniors who live alone enjoy every chance they get to converse with a friend and have to fight hard to ward off the "winter blues," chances are that your efforts will be appreciated for more than just the delicious meal.











The purpose of the Community Standards bylaw is to help keep our community safe, healthy and enjoyable for everyone.

The new Community Standards bylaw encourages residents and property owners to be responsible and respectful of their neighbours and contribute to the health, safety and vibrancy of our community.

#### **BOULEVARDS**

As part of the regular property maintenance in the Summer Village of Val Quentin, residents are responsible to care for the boulevard, alley and driveway crossing adjacent to their property line. This includes the portion of property between the curb or road's edge and the adjacent front property line.

#### Maintaining the Boulevard includes:

Cutting grass to a reasonable length on your portion of the boulevard and ditches.

Removal of fallen leaves and debris from the boulevard and ditches beside your property.

Pruning of trees and shrubs around your property so they do not hang over or beyond your property lines.

All the great efforts by residents are appreciated and contribute to the beautification of the village.

#### Inspect your culverts for blockages.

Over time debris can build up against the openings of your culverts, restricting or even stopping flow. Regularly inspecting your culverts and clearing debris is one of the simplest and most effective steps to minimize potential flooding.



The County acknowledges its municipal partners for their continued vision, collaboration and investment in this vital community health facility.


